

Councils moving to the new structure in 2024, prepared by Mary Bannon Unity Outreach Project was presented to 57/87 65% of councils in the diocese and most councils found it was:

• It was very interesting, completed with two members of the diocesan executive, a good to inform the diocese of some of our issues and we learned about the webinars that are available to us, learned about the sharing and caring webinar, very helpful in understanding the role of the Provincial Council, lots of information shared, but it should have been started before the Strategic planning got started, too little too late, our no answer is because we could not accommodate the timeline given, nice to know that National wanted to hear what we had to say, our council has many gifts, we are very creative, we answered to no and for a visit be scheduled in January 2024, challenging for members regarding some questions, difficult trying to get answers from the membership, some felt more visits should occur with the diocesan level

Many councils had specific projects/focuses for the year that touched on all pillars. Some were new to the diocese, for example:

- Birthright bassinet with baby articles, Soup Supper on Good Friday with all proceeds going to Development and Peace, celebration of National Indigenous Peoples day with First Nations representation, Soup and chilli fundraiser to support Pakistani Refugee family, a month long parish collection for local charity-Ashley's Place as we supported their many
- initiatives with food, clothing, personal hygiene, etc., held month collection for our local Food Bank, participated in the

12 Hours of prayer for Palliative Care, amended our Council's "Manual of Policy and Procedure" to reflect upcoming changes, developed a strategic planning workshop based on information on the CWL website, trying to make a concerted effort to reach out to the homebound and nursing home members, retreat for Family of Parishes. Sock donation for the homeless, Lenten Lunches for the Council of churches, involved with a Fashion Show put on by our 3 Family of Parishes members, went to Convention in Sarnia, helped with Confirmation Retreat day, guest speaker and film presentation-The Stone Pillow-based on homelessness, "Soup for Ukraine" Fundraiser and all proceeds were sent to CNEWA, support of Jesu Ashram in India, formed an Affordable Housing Committee, knitted or crocheted chemo beanies and caps for chemo therapy clinic, new and popular item is our recognition of a featured member, self care tips were provided monthly at meetings and in our newsletter, free community meals, "Family Fun Fest" to encourage families to participate in a church activity, Horizon of Hope, continued doing the "My Story" project, Bee compassion project with Our Lady of Guadalupe home, home for single, homeless mothers, work with the Matthew House, a home for refugees

Sarnia hosted AMM/Convention, hosted Indigenous Blanket exercise

Examples of new and creative ideas for membership campaigns

- New membership should be welcomed all year round
- We instituted a new certificate to acknowledge work done by councils
- Sisters in the league need to make themselves visible so new persons to the parish know who you are
- Provide funfilled activities that encourage people to join or reinstate their membership
- Provide mentorship for new members
- Hold a blue weekend(our diocesan colour) where members wore their
 T-shirts, scares pins or anything blue to signify their CWL membership
- Hold a potluck lunch and invite all the parish and have membership information

Other activities to retain current members and promotion of the league

Common Strategies used in the diocese

- For promotion-announcements from the pulpit, invitations in the bulletin, displays at the entrances of the church
- At special occasions there is a booth or posters promoting the League

Challenges to membership development:

- After effects of Covid: it has taken time for councils to activate and many members were lost because of age and now residing in Nursing Homes
- Priorities have changed –a meeting is no longer a night out with friends

- Many did not like the large jump in dues at one time
- Older members feel left out with the dependence on technology i.e. want a hard copy of the League and diocesan League Lingo
- Having annual memberships only in the Fall as it runs into Christmas time and funds are limited
- Many members are snowbirds and don't pay dues before they leave
- Should annual campaigns be only in the Fall?

Councils primarily used announcements from the pulpit that accompanied bulletin notices, newsletters and telephone calls to contact their membership as well as emails and Face book notifications.

Recommendations for improvements in policy, guidelines, or reporting related to President-Elect/Organization position including identifying at what level of the League.

- Reports are due just before and after Christmas, could the Annual Survey be done in June when we wind down for the summer? New goals are usually set in September and councils start preparing for elections and the same persons are not always re-elected and new persons do not have all the information.
- All levels could pick 3 times a year to engage ne membership. I have requested our councils try for 3 occasions this next year to join together and show everyone the different aspects of the League which hopefully inspires others to join
- Although bi-weekly directives are important it is too much and it is getting overlooked
- The vice-president organization chair can be overwhelming to smaller councils where there is not a full executive. The V>P> needs to not just inspire new membership but needs to provide guidance (mentors) so the new members don't head for the hills.

Catholic education was promoted within council's community or parish through:

• Councils gifted Rosaries to First Communicants, some participated in Sacramental preparation, Councils at school Masses and some lead Rosary at school. Councils sponsored students to attend Right to Life dinner, other councils offer bursaries to young ladies entering Catholic High Schools, some provide scholarships to graduating students who are continuing Post=secondary education, councils have quest speakers who talked about how to present issues like Abortion, Euthanasia and MaiD. Councils facilitate at summer camp, councils presented gifts of Bibles to graduating students that demonstrates Christian Catholic values.

Awareness of mental health (teen suicide, bullying, etc.) was raised through:

 Councils have guest speakers on mental health and Wellness. Some members host monthly Faith based gatherings for families who suffer Mental Illness. Prayers at the meeting and special intentions, other councils have speakers on Homelessness, Human Trafficking and exploitation of individuals

Awareness of Palliative care raided through:

 Councils dedicated 12 Hours of Prayer for Palliative Care using prayers from National and encouraged members to use the toolkit during their assigned hour. They took the four week lectures on Horizon of Hope. Council members attended workshops on Compassionate Care and some volunteer at Hospice. Some had prayer services and shared video.

Activities promoted the need to care for the environment:

 Councils offered Masses to pray for ways to combat Climate Change, opened discussions on banning plastics, take out containers and straws. Councils encouraged members to bring their own utensils, plate and cup during functions and meetings. On Earth Day members are encouraged to help clean up surrounding areas. Some councils have presentations on how to create a natural habitat for birds and pollinators in an urban landscape. Other councils have speakers on Composters, Digesters and Biodiversity.

Councils educated members and their parish communities on Women's health issues:

 The Parish Nurse was invited to talk on Women's Health and Wellness. Councils provided personal care products and shared websites on health issues. They wrote letters for the White Ribbon Campaign against Pornography.

Councils supported immigrants and refugees moving to Canada through:

 Councils donated non-perishables to the St. Vincent de Paul for distribution to migrant parishioners. Clothing, furniture, and monetary donations were collected. They helped reunite a family. Member also donated to the Ukraine Relief Fund.



As a result of this undertaking, we were able to financially help Gianna Home- a home for mothers needing assistance to provide a good beginning for their children. St. Joseph's Hospice which ,without any cost supports all those who are needing end of life care and in addition funds were able to be donated to the SVDP Food Bank. This coming together for a common cause was very fulfilling.
